Vote Yes on California Prop 3 to protect Californian's Freedom to Marry. You may not be aware that our freedom to marry who we love in California right now is thanks to a decision by the U.S. Supreme Court which overruled our state constitution. California's state constitution says "Only marriage between a man and a woman is valid or recognized in California." Important dates 2024 California General Election

- Ballots start being mailed out by October 7, 2024
- Vote-by-mail ballots can be retuned starting October 8, 2024
- Deadline to register in California October 21, 2024
- Voter's Choice Counties' in-person voting begins October 26, 2024
- Election Day November 5, 2024
- Vote-by-mail ballots must be postmarked on or before Election Day!



Letter from President Sara Larson

Happy Pride! This is a happy time of year for me.

I don't get out into the world as much as I probably should. I work at home, helping my mother and making the household "machine" run smoothly. Pride season is an opportunity to get out into the world and cross-pollinate with other people and organizations. This is the first year I participated in the San Francisco Pride parade. I went with my son, and we rode in the PFLAG San Francisco trolley. It was grand! What a great experience. For the Silicon Valley Pride parade, I walked. It was fun to see all the tech companies with their Pride t-shirts, all the people bringing their dogs to watch the parade, all the children. The weather was perfect too.



We need more volunteers. What are you interested in? Could you help us out? Here are a few areas where we need help.

Volunteer Coordinator: the volunteer coordinator is in charge of filling all the volunteer jobs. Most of these are working at tables at Pride events, but there are also other roles. Right now, there is a spread sheet of volunteers' names, email addresses, phone numbers, and areas of interest. For example, I would be listed as Sara Larson, <u>sara.larson@pflagsanjose.org</u>, parent of a transgender person. The volunteer list is kept up to date as much as possible, to remove people who don't or can't volunteer this year, or to show if somebody is less than 18 years of age but still wants to volunteer. We have a waiver form for the parents of minors to use if their kids want to volunteer for PFLAG.

Scholarship Committee: volunteers on the scholarship committee help decide who will receive our annual PFLAG San Jose/Peninsula scholarships. After a brief training, volunteers spend a couple of weeks in the month of February reviewing PFLAG scholarship applications. Later, there will also be interviews with the applicants. Then the scholarship recipients are announced, and the luncheon in May is where we celebrate the recipients.

The Scholarship Committee also needs one volunteer to attend the monthly scholarship meetings with the scholarship management group we belong to, eQuality. This person will hold the title of "leader," but I can help find more volunteers to help round out the committee if this individual can't do it alone.

Parades, festivals, volunteerism, all of these increase the visibility of LGBTQ people. Make sure people can see you.

Support Meeting Schedule



Learning About Supporting Legislation to Support LGBTQ+ Lives

I have been learning a lot about advocacy and this spring I had my first opportunity to advocate for specific legislation. Back in May, PFLAG National and our own chapter, along with many other organizations in California, signed on to support bill AB 1955, also known as the SAFETY Act. The bill strengthens protections for LGBTQ+ kids in California against forced outing policies at schools. It is another powerful experience where I am learning a lot about our state government and meeting a lot of amazing LGBTQ+ advocates and allies.

First, I learned about contacting our representatives. They are understandably very busy, but I found out that they are also very eager to hear from their constituents. There are many ways to do it, way easier than I imagined. You can go on their Contact page on their website and email them about your concerns and their staff really does carry your message to them. If you call their office, you can leave a short message with their staff. And if you sign up for you representative's newsletters, you will often find out about coffees and meet and greets in your area where you can shake hands, tell them your concerns, and ask them directly where they stand. All of these are effective in letting them know how you want them to represent you and I had the chance to do them all while advocating for AB 1955 - and bugged everyone I knew to do the same!

Later, as the SAFETY Act moved along, it was put before different senate and assembly committees who voted to deny or pass the bill before sending it to their respective floors for a vote. I got to attend two of these hearings at the capitol in Sacramento. It was tough but informative to watch and listen to experts both for and against. Time is given for the public attending the hearing to stand before the committee and give their "me too," which just means giving their name and stating if they are in support or opposition. It only takes a few seconds, but it can feel very empowering to personally be part of the process. As I missed the last hearing, I have also been happy to learn to navigate the senate's and assembly's online media archives where you can almost immediately watch a recording of every committee hearing.

As I am writing this, the SAFETY Act has passed all the committees, and we are waiting for the final floor vote in the Assembly^{*}. Hopefully from there it will be a short trip to the governor's desk for a final signature and it will become effective in 2025. The opposition is increasingly loud as the bill has moved forward, but I am very optimistic about this bill, and it will help send a strong message to people spreading hate and misinformation. But it certainly will not be the end of the road. I know I will soon use what I have learned and continue to learn and meet more amazing people as we advocate for a safe and bright future for our LBGTQ+ loved ones. Love wins!

* Update: As of 6/27, The SAFETY Act passed the Assembly vote and is now on its way to Governor Newsom's desk.

PFLAG LGBTQ+ Elders Interviews Podcast Personal Stories in the Making of LGBTQ History

From Palm Springs, CA, and a Palm Springs City Council member, meet **Lisa Middleton**, a transgender woman in her early 70s who has led an inspiring and varied life with no signs of slowing down. Holding high-level corporate positions before stepping into local politics, Lisa is currently a candidate for the CA State Senate representing Riverside and San Bernardino counties – predicted to be the closest election in CA in recent years.

Lisa comes from an organic part of California pioneers, the Dust Bowl Generation. Her family came to California with a storyline not far off track from the beloved characters found in John Steinbeck's *The Grapes of Wrath* – to CA from Oklahoma in the 1930's, leaving behind great poverty and poor prospects of opportunity, most of them went into the fields as laborers in California.



Having been moved to LA at the age of one, Lisa scrambled her way through an education that had her finishing up with a Master's degree at USC.

Lisa's interview takes us through her decades living out her not-true self with great loneliness but always a sense of doing her best wherever life took her: marriage to a man, children, her work-life and her waking up time during the Civil Rights period, when she discovered she could no longer live a lie.

Lisa has a warm, matter-of-fact style and she strikes her listeners as a person greatly at home with all the facets of her life. Enjoy meeting Lisa Middleton.

- Both grandmas thought the group was very interesting.


